

THE RISE AND FALL OF THE "OLIVE LODGE" IN ALDERNEY

BACKGROUND

Alderney is the most northerly of the islands in the archipelago that makes up the Bailiwick of Guernsey and Alderney. It is three square miles in size, and is situated twenty miles from Guernsey, sixty miles from England, and it is separated by a ten mile stretch of the fast flowing Alderney Race from Cap de la Hogue in the Cotentin Peninsula of Normandy, France.

By virtue of its remoteness, it has always had a certain amount of self-government. Following the departure of the Commonwealth garrison and Lieutenant Governor in the 17th Century a series of strong local families undertook the governance of the island. Firstly, the De Carterets of Jersey, followed by Sir Edmond Andros of Guernsey, and lastly by the Le Mesurier family of Guernsey who ruled until they surrendered the post to the States of Alderney in 1825.

Henry Le Mesurier commissioned a series of civil engineering works, and in 1736 he moved the main harbour from Longuis to Braye, resulting in the construction of a new jetty and warehouses to encourage the export of cattle to England. This brought wealth and prosperity to the island. A new court house was built in 1770 and a new school and Methodist Chapel in 1790 following a visit to the island by John Wesley in 1787.

An important aid to communication in time of war was built, when in 1811 a Telegraph Tower was completed above La Foudere, but the major construction of military forts barracks and the longest breakwater in Great Britain did not take place until the middle of the nineteenth century. This building work and the subsequent garrisoning of large numbers of English speaking troops effected major changes in both language and customs.

Freemasonry in the Channel Islands

The first known Freemasonry to come to the Channel Islands arrived in Guernsey with a "Moderns" Lodge, the Lilly Tavern Number 228 on 10th May 1753. This was followed quickly by the formation of a "Moderns" Province on 22 December 1753 under the Provincial Grand Mastership of Thomas Dobréé. His oversight was laid down as Provincial Grand Master of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark and Arme (sic). He was a merchant and ship owner from a prosperous French family with connections to Normandy. He was a Guernsey resident but with commercial offices in France and London as well as Guernsey.

During his Provincial oversight more Lodges opened-

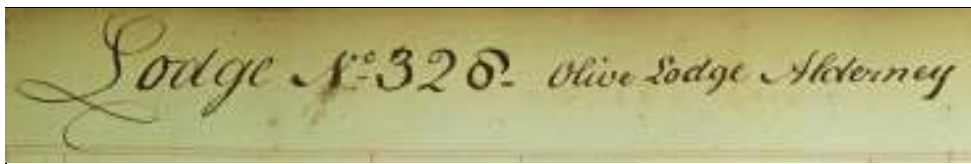
- 1760 The Three Crowns Tavern (Moderns) Number 256. Erased 1768
- 1763 The Orange Lodge (Antients) Number 116. Lapsed soon after founding
- 1774 The Lodge of Harmony (Moderns) Number 472. Warrant forfeited 1812
- 1784 Mariners Lodge (Antients) Number 222, shown also as the Ship and Castle, and is the earliest Lodge still in existence.
- 1789 The Three Crowns Lodge (Antients) Number 116 Erased 1829

The year 1798 saw the death of Dobréé and with it the closure of the first Masonic Province of the Channel Islands.

In 1802 The Olive Lodge Alderney (Antients) Number 328 was founded.

In 1804 Lieutenant General Sir John Doyle is appointed Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of The Bailiwick of Guernsey and Alderney and in 1806 is appointed Provincial Grand Master (Moderns).

We shall now return to Alderney and the Olive Lodge. It will be seen that the new Lodge was founded during the interregnum between Dobreé's death and the appointment of Sir John Doyle as the new Provincial Grand Master.

At this point it might be worth giving details of how a new Lodge might be constituted at this time in the Antient tradition and without the benefit of a Provincial Grand Master.

Unfortunately no record exists in either the Guernsey Provincial Museum or in the Grand Lodge Archives of the process of administration of the constitution of the new Olive Lodge. However a complete picture is possible as a few years later in 1805 a Petition was offered to Grand Lodge for the establishment of a new Lodge, to be called The Lodge of Harmony.

Members of Mariners Lodge No. 222 wrote to the Grand Master requesting permission to form a new Lodge. This was duly accepted and on the 6th September 1806 the Grand Master, the Duke of Atholl appointed Rt. Worshipful Brother William Jones to act as a Deputy Grand Master with authority "To act in all manner of things necessary for the Constitution of the said Lodge, but for no other business what so ever".

From the membership list of the new Olive Lodge, it would seem that there were only five founding members, of which one was a school master from Jersey.

They were the following-

- James Gibson - Worshipful Master shown as a Tobacconist but also a Lieutenant of Artillery from Mariners Lodge No. 222.
- Francis Touzel - Senior Warden Schoolmaster from Jersey Lodge of Fortitude No.287.
- Stephen Bidbrook - Junior Warden shown as an Inn keeper but also a Lieutenant of Artillery probably from Orange Lodge No. 116A.
- P J Le Cheminant - Secretary shown as an ordinance stores officer. No details of his previous lodge membership are known but there is a record of a Pierre Jean Le Cheminant living in England.
- Nicholas Lihou a Haberdasher from Unity Lodge No. 337A.

The Warrant states that the Lodge will meet on the first and third Saturday each calendar month at the Royal George Hotel in Alderney.

From the opening of the Lodge on 31 August 1802 until 13 July 1803 there is no sign of open discord. However, on 13 July 1803, a regular request for Grand Lodge Certificates with the required payment mentions a previous letter which opens the lid on a major disagreement between the senior officers of the Lodge.

The origins of this rift seem to centre around a disagreement of the Senior Warden, Francis Touzel with P T Le Cheminant the Lodge Secretary. There must have been simmering discord between them as it was reported that in discussion with Brother Thomas Ward of Lodge 116 Guernsey, he alleged that Touzel had accused Brother Le Cheminant of poaching pupils for his school by visiting their parents.

The minutes of the Lodge meeting held on the 6th November 1802 state that the Worshipful Master, Brother James Gibson ordered Touzel to prove his accusations against Brother Le Cheminant or withdraw them.

"Touzel acknowledged that they were false and that he was ready and willing to muster an apology to Brother Le Cheminant, which he did to his satisfaction, and to the approbation of the Worshipful Master and members present. However, after the necessary remonstrances to him, he so much deviated from common reason by breaking through all order. He refused to conform himself by the By Laws of Masonry. He was found unwitting of the Society and was therefore Excluded from Masonry for ever."

The section in italics is a digest of the Minutes as discussed at a meeting of the Lodge on 15th January 1803.

A copy of the minutes were sent to Grand Lodge for action. Worshipful Brother Robert Leslie, the Grand Secretary cautioned from precipitate action, and suggested further efforts be made to patch up the situation. He finished his note with the words *"In so young a Lodge it is a pity that misunderstanding should take place"*.

On the 27th February 1803 a letter was received by W.Bro. Robert Leslie which acknowledged both the letter and its sentiments. However, he stated, it was not possible to change the Lodges mind in this matter.

Wise judgement however failed to be taken, and in a regular communication to Grand Lodge on the 13th July 1803, in the last paragraph it was again asked if the necessary action had been taken to confirm Brother Francis Touzel's Exclusion.

On 2nd August 1803 Francis Touzel wrote a passionate letter to Robert Leslie requesting that the matter be again reviewed. As he was now ready and willing to do what was necessary to satisfactorily close the situation.

In reading the correspondence it becomes clear that it was the last in a series of correspondences between Francis Touzel and Robert Leslie. However, it was to no avail and a letter was received by Robert Leslie stating that Touzel was resigning his post, leaving Alderney, and returning to Jersey. He asked if a final favourable result might be made before he left the island. From his perspective this did not happen, and we hear nothing further of Francis Touzel.

At this point a review of the Lodge membership might be of interest. Of the fourteen new members before the Lodge disagreements, five were seafarers, one was William Sleeboon, a joining member from Dorth in Holland, one was Christian Shrueuder from Hanover, one from the Isle of Wight and one from Guernsey. The rest may or may not have been from Alderney. This does not paint a picture of a rush to join this new Lodge by indigenous members of the island.

Membership of the Lodge from December 1803 until 1806 is also worthy of analysis. Of the twenty three new members, the following were from non-Island residence although one came to live on the island because of his job as King's Pilot and Inn Keeper. One was from Barbados, one from Chichester, five from the Isle of Wight, one from Christchurch, Hampshire and one from Pagham, Sussex. Also, one had his Grand Lodge Certificate delivered to an address in London. Sadly nine had no place of residence shown, but we might consider that they were local residents. Only one is actually an Alderney resident. This must show an inherent weakness, as six are shown as sea captains. Of the rest from non-island sources, some must have been in the merchant naval service and thus not available to take a regular active role in the Lodges proceedings.

There appears to have been only three Initiations in 1805, with two new Masons from the Isle of Wight and one from Portsmouth and only one in 1806. This may be that the records of others are lost, along with their names.

However, things looked up again in 1807 with thirteen new Masons being Initiated. Again however nine are shown as sea captains, two probably junior officers in the Royal Navy in ships stationed in Alderney, one in the fifth Regiment of Foot, and one Alderney resident who was a Cooper.

1808 saw a further five new Masons, but all were sea captains, one from Alderney, one from the Isle of Wight, one from Weymouth, one from Pixhill and one from Pagham, Sussex.

1809 saw a further seventeen new Masons Initiated of which two were sea captains, two were sergeants in the 67th Foot, two were merchants and one a bricklayer. Ten were in the 44th Regiment the Sussex Regiment

1810 saw only three new Masons all sea captains and 1811 a solitary farmer.

Following the Touzel incident, the lodge seems to have proceeded, not to say smoothly, for some years. As you will have seen, the membership is not one that builds a stable base with so many members either living abroad, or being in the Merchant service.

In January 1806 a new Master was elected — William Dorey. However, in January 1807, James Gibson is back and in August, although the half Yearly return is sent under Gibson's name it is returned by George Blake Lodge Secretary as Gibson is absent from the Island. On the 25th of November a letter from George Blake to Robert Leslie is signed under his name as Gibson is too ill of the Palsey, to act.

On the 12th January 1808 Stephen Bedbrook sent a letter to Robert Leslie stating that he has been elected Worshipful Master and apologising for a breakdown in communication. In reply, Leslie reminds him that Returns must be in by St. Johns Day (24 June).

On the 22nd of July George Blake is again apologising for late returns, but pleads the election of the new Master had to be stopped as he was not in the Island, and thus there was no installation ceremony.

In a letter of the 1st of August from the Ecole Publique, George Blake wrote to Robert Leslie expressing his great sadness that Brother James Gibson had been declared deranged, and they recommended that he be placed in St Luke's Hospital for Lunatics in London. He also took the opportunity to appeal to Grand Lodge for financial assistance for Gibson's wife and family especially with regard to the expected funeral expenses.

On the 30th of August 1808, George Blake, Secretary of the Lodge, sends a list of new members to Robert Leslie. A further letter from Blake mentions the death of James Gibson, and he asks that the body be not returned to the island for burial, but rather it be interred in London.

Also on the same letter, a note is recorded from Lucy Gibson his widow stating that she paid into George Blake's hand the balance of £6 being the remains of the account of her late husband. Again, a further letter concerning the funeral expenses is sent by Blake to Leslie very concerned that his previous correspondence had been lost, and he was taking particular care with his new letter, as he was putting it in the care of the packet ships captain for the journey to Portsmouth and onward to London. He also mentions that he was unable to obtain six pounds of Bank of England notes but the Guernsey notes offered were payable in London.

A new team of Lodge officers seem to have been chosen by 15th March 1809. The Worshipful Master was Edward Stewart, and William Dorey was Secretary. Unfortunately Edward Stewart was a ship's captain residing in Portsmouth, and the ceremony and half yearly returns had to be held over until he was back in the island.

Captain Stewart's absence from the island was causing problems, and it is noted that by the 27th December 1809, Stephen Bedbrook was again Worshipful Master and Robert James Senior Warden. The Junior Warden is shown as Thomas Bedbrook, who might perhaps be Stephen's son. Thomas Fudge was Secretary. There were eight new Initiates for whom Certificates were required. We know that they were members of the 44th Regiment then stationed in Alderney. In the following letter from Thomas Fudge, Secretary, of sometime after the 27th December 1809 a request was made to Leslie for copies of the five missing Grand Lodge Certificates as these soldiers were going on overseas on Foreign Service.

The end of the Lodge was drawing near. A letter from Thomas Fudge to Robert Leslie of the 3rd of the August 1810 stated that due to poor attendance and low membership, there was not a quorum at the last meeting and with no likelihood of improvement it was his duty to return the Lodge's Warrant.

After the return of the Warrant, Olive Lodge closed officially on 13 August 1810. The number and warrant was then transferred to Royal Marine Lodge which was Constituted on 23 November 1810 and meeting at the Lodge Room, Barracks, Woolwich, London.

Thus, for the next forty-one years there was no active Freemasons Lodges on the Island of Alderney. It was not until the 27th June 1851 that St Anns Lodge No. 593 was Consecrated and this Lodge continues to this day.

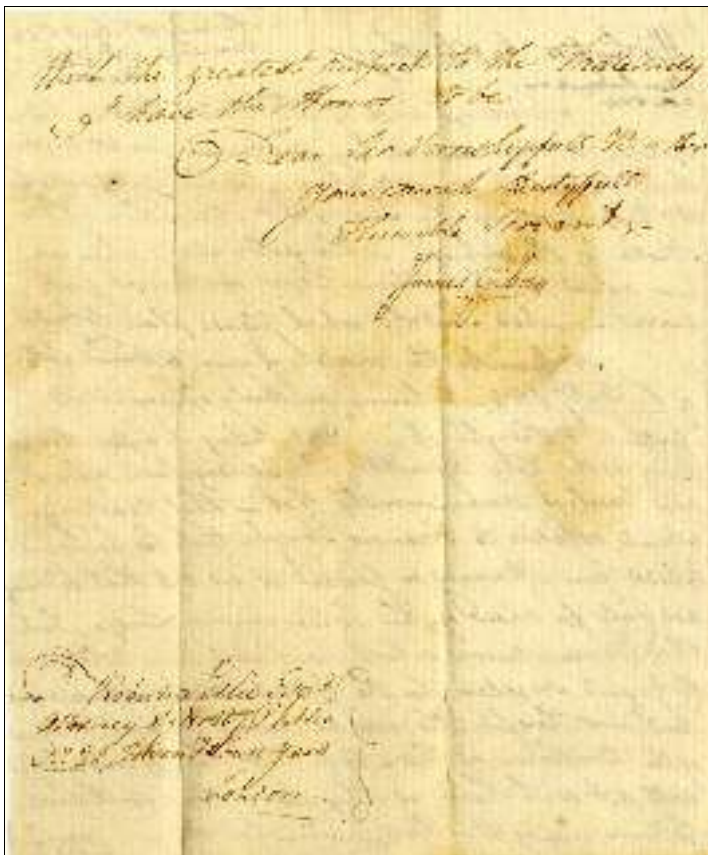
