Chapter One

Early Life

Lieutenant-Colonel Arthur Hansard was Provincial Grand Master for the Province of Guernsey and Alderney from 1910 – 1927. This booklet will document his life and the Fifth Provincial Grand Lodge.

Arthur Clifton Hansard was born on the 11th June 1855 in Paddington, London, England, the son of Colonel Luke Henry Hansard and Georgina Hansard née Evans. He was baptised on the 21st July 1855 at Saint James Church, Paddington, London and was one of two children, his sister Edith Laura being born in 1856.

In the 1861 census at the age of five he is shown living with his parents in Aldingbourne, Sussex, England. He was educated at Winchester College, Hampshire and is shown on the 1871 census as being a boarder at the school aged fifteen.

In December 1885 at Camberwell, Surrey he married Marion Sarah Simons who was born in Kensington, London on the 21st May 1861. On 19th September 1890 Arthur's father died, and just a few months later Arthur's wife gave birth to their first child a daughter Arddyn Edith Lizze Hansard on the 7th February 1891 at Kensington. London she was followed by a son Luke Arthur Simons Hansard on 12th August 1893 at Little Heath Villa, Charlton, London.

Chapter Two

Military Life

Following his schooling Arthur moved to the Royal Military Academy, at Sandhurst, Surrey, having joined the Royal Regiment of Artillery as a Cadet Officer with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant on 27th August 1870. He was promoted to temporary Lieutenant on 17th August 1874 whilst still at Sandhurst and on graduation from Sandhurst he was promoted to Lieutenant, effective from 17th February 1875.

Arthur was shown after this promotion based at the Royal Artillery Barracks 2, at Woolwich, London and was shown as still being based there on the 1881 census aged 25. He was further promoted on 1st September 1883 this time to Captain at the School of Gunnery and on completion of his tenure on 1st April 1885 was promoted to Vice-Major. He was promoted this time to Major on 3rd June 1891.

He was promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel on 15th March 1900 aged 45 and at the time of the 1901 census he was shown as living at 34 Evelyn Mansions, Carlisle Place, Westminster, London. On the 1st October 1901 he was transferred from the position of Artillery Advisor to the Inspector General of Fortifications to the role of Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General for Military Operations at Headquarters. On the 10th February 1904 he was made a substantive Colonel. On the 1st October 1905 he vacated his appointment as Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General for Military Operations and on 18th July 1906 was placed as Officer in Charge of Military Records. On 20th April 1909 he was given the Freedom of the City of London as a member of the Company of Stationers.

On the 18th July 1910 at the end of his tenure as Officer in Charge of Records, he was placed on half pay, before formally retiring on 11th June 1912. On the 1911 census he is shown as living at 17A Cadogan Gardens, Chelsea, where he continued to live until his death.

During the First World War he was re-employed by the British Army from 5th October 1914 when he was again placed as Colonel in charge of Military Records (retired) until he retired due to ill health in November 1916. For his service to the Nation on 1st January 1917 in the New Year's Honours List King George V created him as a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George (CMG). He is also known in official documents as P.G.D Eng. referring to a Postgraduate Diploma in Engineering. However, no record has been found confirming when this appointment was made.

This Indenture must be enrolled at the Chamberlain's Office, Guildhall, within Twelve Months: and on the death or change of Master, the Apprentice must come to Stationers' Hall, to be returned over to the Executor, or New Master, and afterwards go to the Chamberlain's Office, or he will lose his Freedom.



This Indenture witnesses, That *John Arthur Simon Hansard* the Son of *Arthur Clifton Hansard of 170A Gadsdon Road, Chelsea in the County of Middlesex (Citizen and Stationer)* (without any Sum of Money, or other Thing, given or contracted for with the said *John Arthur Simon Hansard* to the said *Arthur Clifton Hansard* herein after named doth put himself Apprentice to the said *Arthur Clifton Hansard* Citizen and STATIONER of London, to learn his Art, and with him (after the Manner of an Apprentice) to serve from the Day of the Date of these Presents, until the full End and Term of *Five* Years from thence next following, to be fully complete and ended. During which Term the said Apprentice his said Master faithfully shall serve, his Secrets keep, his lawful Commandments everywhere gladly do. He shall do no Damage to his said Master, nor see to be done of others, but that he to his Power shall left, or forthwith give warning to his said Master of the same. He shall not waste the Goods of his said Master, nor lend them unlawfully to any. He shall not commit Fornication within the said Term. He shall not play at Cards, Dice, Tables, or any other unlawful Games, whereby his said Master may have any Loss. With his own Goods or others, during the said Term, without license of his said Master, he shall neither Buy nor Sell. He shall not haunt Taverns, or Play-houses, nor absent himself from his said Master's Service Day nor Night unlawfully: But in all Things as a faithful Apprentice he shall behave himself towards his said Master and all His, during the said Term. And the said Master his said Apprentice *vice* in the same Art and Mystery which he useth, by the best means that he can, shall Teach and Instruct, or cause to be Taught and Instructed, finding unto his said Apprentice, Meat, Drink, Apparel, Lodging, and all other Necessaries, according to the Custom of the City of London, during the said Term. And to the true Performance of all and every the said Covenants and Agreements either of the said Parties binds himself unto the other by these Presents. In Witness whereof, the Parties above-named to these Indentures have put their Hands and Seals the *seventh* Day of *October* Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord Edward of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, &c., and in the Year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and *seven*.

Chapter Three

Masonic Career

Arthur had a varied Masonic Career, became a member of many Craft Lodges and joined the Royal Arch and many of the other side orders. We will begin by looking at his Lodge History and then touch on his membership of the appendage orders.

At the age of 33 on the 9th May 1887 he was Initiated in Ubique Lodge No.1789, meeting at Regent Masonic Hall, Café Royal, Regent Street, London. This Lodge was consecrated only eight years earlier on the 21st January 1879. He was Passed on the 10th June the same year and Raised on 13th February 1888, and he served as Worshipful Master of the Lodge in 1893. Arthur went onto join several Lodges as listed below.

On the 5th June 1905 he became a joining member of Royal Alpha Lodge No.16 meeting at the Imperial Restaurant, Regent Street, London and served as Worshipful Master of that Lodge in 1922.

On the 14th January 1910 he became a joining member of Lodge of Friendship No.6 which also met at the Imperial Restaurant, Regent Street, London.

His connection to Guernsey come on the 13th April 1910 when he became a joining member of Doyles Lodge of Fellowship No.84, meeting at the Freemasons Hall, St Peter Port, Guernsey.

He was also the Founder member of the Old Wykehamist Lodge No.3548 on the 20th October 1911 which met at Freemasons Hall, Great Queen Street London and the Consecrating Officer of two Lodges in Guernsey. Firstly Hansard Lodge No.3515 on the 30th May 1911, followed by St Martins Lodge No.4142 on the 30th September 1920. We will look at Hansard and St Martins Lodges in further detail later on.

He was appointed Past Junior Grand Deacon by the United Grand Lodge of England in 1902 and in 1910 he was further promoted to Right Worshipful Brother.

In the Royal Arch he was Exalted in Ubique Chapter, No.1789, London in 1890, where he served as First Principal in 1896. He became a joining member of Leopold Shuttleworth's Chapter No.1591, London, where he served as First Principal and Doyle's Chapter of Fellowship, No.84, St. Peter Port, Guernsey. He was appointed Past Grand Standard Bearer by the Supreme Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of England in 1902 and served as Grand Superintendent of Guernsey and Alderney from 1910 again until his death.

In Mark Master Masons he was Advanced in Florence Nightingale Mark Lodge, No.44, London in March 1888. He became a joining member of Ubique Lodge, No.411, London, where he served as Worshipful Master in 1893 and Oxford and Cambridge University Lodge, No.504, London, where he served as Worshipful Master in 1893. He was appointed Grand Assistant Director of Ceremonies by the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of England and Wales and its Districts and Lodges Overseas in 1903 and he was promoted to Grand Junior Warden in 1913. In the Royal Ark Mariners he was elevated in Ubique Lodge, No. 411, London of Royal Ark Mariners.

In the Ancient and Accepted Rite, he was perfected in Studholme Chapter, No. 67, London in 1893, where he became a Past Most Wise Sovereign. He became Inspector General Rose Croix for the South Eastern District

(Kent, Surrey and Sussex) in 1908. He was awarded his 33^o in 1909. He became a member of the Supreme Council and was appointed Grand Chamberlain in 1912.

He became a Past Grand Principal Conductor of Works in the Royal and Select Masters and a member of the Royal Order of Scotland.

He also supported the Masonic charities and became a Vice-President of the three Masonic Institutions.

His son Luke Arthur Simons Hansard followed his father into the craft where he was Initiated into Isaac Newton University Lodge No.859, on 28th October 1913, Passed 25th November the same year and Raised on the 3rd February 1914. On the 23rd Nov 1914 he became a joining member of a Lodge named after his father, Hansard Lodge No.3515, meeting at the Masonic Hall, St Sampson's, Guernsey and also joined his father's founding Lodge, Old Wykehamist Lodge, No.3548 on 4th February 1915.

Chapter Four

The Fifth Provincial Grand Lodge of Guernsey & Alderney

The Fifth Provincial Grand Lodge of Guernsey & Alderney began in 1910 as a result of the death of Brigade Surgeon James Balfour Cockburn M.D, who served as Provincial Grand Master from 1894 until his death in 1907. The interim period from 1907 – 1910 was covered by Sir Edward Chepmell Ozanne as the Deputy Provincial Grand Master in Charge. He had been offered the post of Provincial Grand Master but turned it down, writing in a letter to the United Grand Lodge of England dated the 4th November 1909 *"I am a poor man and have not overmuch to meet the many social and other claims which fall upon me. After much thought I feel that I would not do my duty to the Province as P.G.M"*.

Considering this, in 1910 the United Grand Lodge of England appointed Right Worshipful Brother Hansard as Provincial Grand Master for the Province of Guernsey & Alderney. This could be seen as an unusual appointment with him not residing on either Island, however with no one else able to take the role the appointment was made.

At 5 pm on the 20th July 1910 Brethren assembled at the Market Halls for the Installation of Colonel Arthur Clifton Hansard as the Provincial Grand Master for the Province. The ceremony was conducted by Right Worshipful Brother the Earl of Donoughmore P.G.W. Eng, who was assisted by members of the Provincial Grand Lodge Past and Present of Grand Lodge. Supporting the Installing Officer was Worshipful Brother E.C. Ozanne, Deputy Provincial Grand Master in Charge.

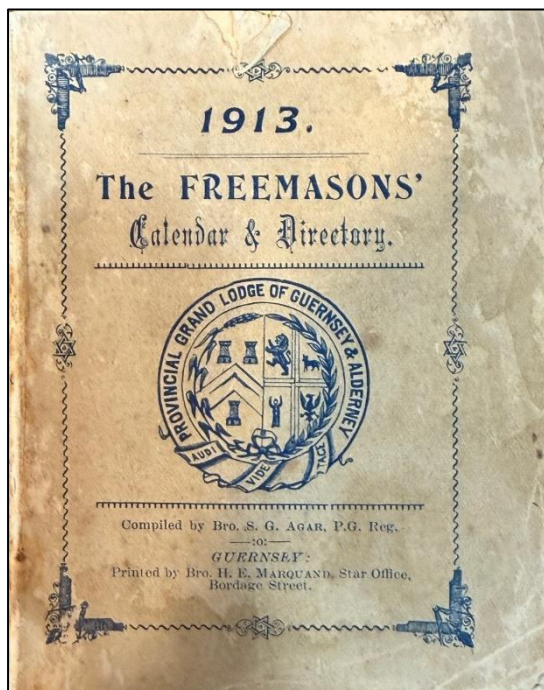

Chapter Five

Hansard Lodge

At 5.15 pm on Tuesday, 30th May 1911 brethren gathered at the South New Market Hall which had been specially prepared for the occasion. This hall had been frequently used for Masonic functions on a large scale and was admirably adapted for the purpose, for the Consecration of a new Lodge named after the Provincial Grand Master Right Worshipful Brother Hansard, who was also the Consecrating Officer.

The brethren of the various Lodges who had been invited to the ceremony having taken their seats, the Founders of this new Lodge numbered sixteen. Eight of these came from St Sampson's Lodge and four from Doyle's Lodge of Fellowship who were seated in the centre of the room. The Provincial Grand Master Right Worshipful Brother Hansard along with the Deputy Provincial Grand Master WBro Ozanne entered the room with members of the Provincial Grand Lodge the Lodge was then opened by the Provincial Grand Master.

The minutes of the meeting recorded the occasion as follows,

Consecration Minutes

The Brethren of the various Lodges who had been invited to attend the Consecration ceremony having taken their seats, with the Founders seated in the centre of the room, the Consecrating Officer, the Right Worshipful Bro. Col. A. C. Hansard R.A., accompanied by WBro. Edward C. Ozanne P. G. Deacon, Deputy Provincial Grand Master of Guernsey and Alderney, as Senior Warden, WBro. Capt. Geo. B. Preston P. G. D. The Lodge was opened in the 1st Degree by the Rt Worshipful Pro Grand Master.

The Lodge was opened in the 3rd Degree and the opening hymn sung.

The Chaplain was called upon to give the opening prayer after which the Consecrating Officer addressed the Brethren on the motive of the Meeting and called upon the Director of Ceremonies to state the wishes of the Brethren.

The Director of Ceremonies read the petition of the Brethren praying for the foundation of the Hansard Lodge.

The Consecrating Officer replied and gave directions to the Director of Ceremonies to array the Brethren of the New Lodge in order and to read the Warrant from Grand Lodge granting permission for the Lodge to be founded.

After the Consecrating Officer enquired of the Brethren of the New Lodge if they approved of the officers named in the Warrant and the Brethren had signified their approval in Masonic form, he called upon the Chaplain to deliver an Oration of the Nature and Principles of the Institution.

The Consecration then proceeded with an anthem, the Dedication Prayer and the Invocation by the Consecrating Officer, together with verses from the Volume of the Sacred Law by the Chaplain.

The Director of Ceremonies uncovered the Lodge Board, and the Consecrating Officer and Wardens carried the Elements of Consecration three times round the Lodge, halting in the East at each perambulation.

The Consecrating Officer then circuited the Lodge four times: at the first Corn – the symbol of plenty. was scattered; the second time Wine, the symbol of Joy and Cheerfulness, was poured; the third time Oil, the symbol of Peace and Unanimity, and at the fourth circuit Salt, the symbol of Fidelity and Friendship, was sprinkled.

The Lodge was then Dedicated by the Consecrating Officer and the Dedication Prayer pronounced by the Chaplain.

After the singing of the Vesper Hymn the Consecrating Officer Constituted the Lodge and called upon the Chaplain to give the Patriarchal Blessing.

The Consecrating Officer enquired, and was duly assured, that WBro. Ira Clifford Ozanne was well skilled in the Craft.

The Consecrating Officer then Installed WBro. Ozanne in the Chair of King Solomon according to Ancient Custom. The Worshipful Master then called upon the Brethren of the Lodge to elect a Treasurer and a Tyler. Bro. W Turner was elected Treasurer and Bro Blackmore Tyler.

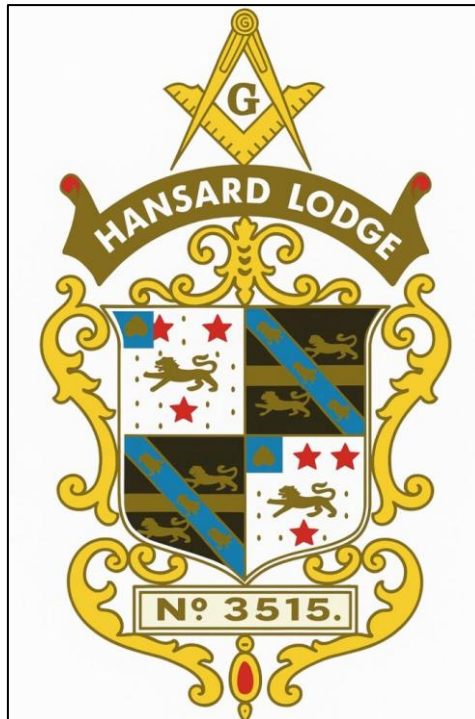

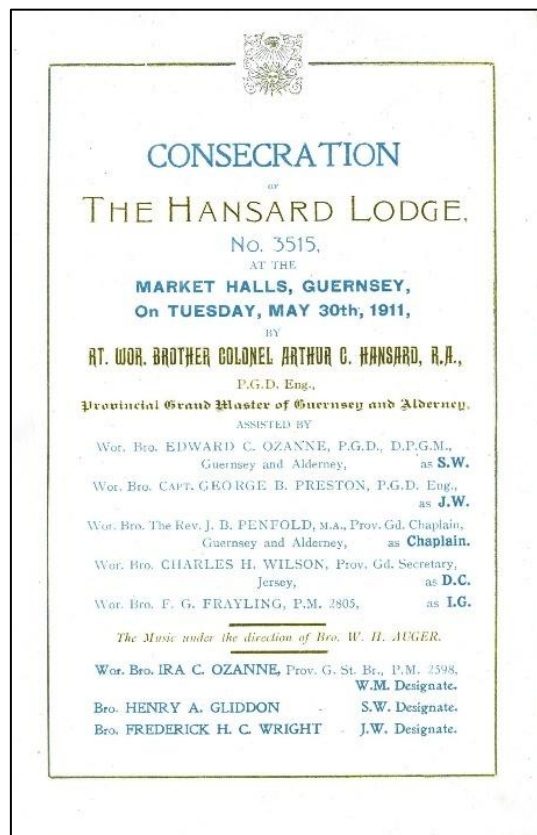
After hearty greetings and best wishes from all the Brethren representing the Lodges as per signature book, the Lodge was closed in Solemn Harmony at 7.45 pm.

After the Consecrating Officer had addressed the Brethren on the purpose of the meeting the Director of Ceremonies WBro C. H. Wilson the Provincial Grand Secretary of Jersey read the petition praying for the foundation of the new Lodge as well as the Warrant granting the necessary permission. The Lodge was then consecrated. The Provincial Grand Master proceeded to install WBro Ira C. Ozanne as Worshipful Master, who then appointed and invested his officers. Following this a collection was made for the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys, and a banquet held at Gardener's Royal Hotel for around 80 Brethren.

Hansard Lodge can therefore look on St Sampsons Lodge No.2598 as its mother Lodge. Indeed, for a number of years Hansard Lodge met at the Masonic Temple at St Sampson's, just off the Bridge.

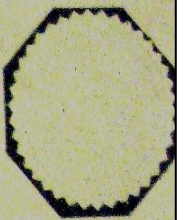

Chapter Six

The Great War

World War One broke out in 1914 four years after Right Worshipful Brother Hansard who was Installed as Provincial Grand Master. This of course saw a huge impact on the Islanders of the Province and those in England, with the Provincial Grand Master coming out of his retirement. He was re-employed by the British Army from 5th October 1914, when he was again placed as Colonel in charge of Military Records (retired), until he retired due to ill health in November 1916.

Guernsey however, not being subject to the call to arms by conscription, saw the death of many men including several local Freemasons who were already serving or volunteering in the forces. Bro Micheal Beecham, VW Bro Simon Hamon and WBro John Prout published a very informative booklet entitled "Roll of Honor of Freemasons of the Province of Guernsey and Alderney 1914 – 1918" that is available on the Provincial Website and in the Library, but it would be remiss not to include the list of local Freemasons who paid the ultimate price during this period of Right Worshipful Bro Hansard's time in office.

Chapter Seven

Bi-Centenary of the United Grand Lodge of England

During Right Worshipful Brother Hansards tenure as Provincial Grand Master the United Grand Lodge of England celebrated its Bi-Centenary in 1917, having been formed in 1717.

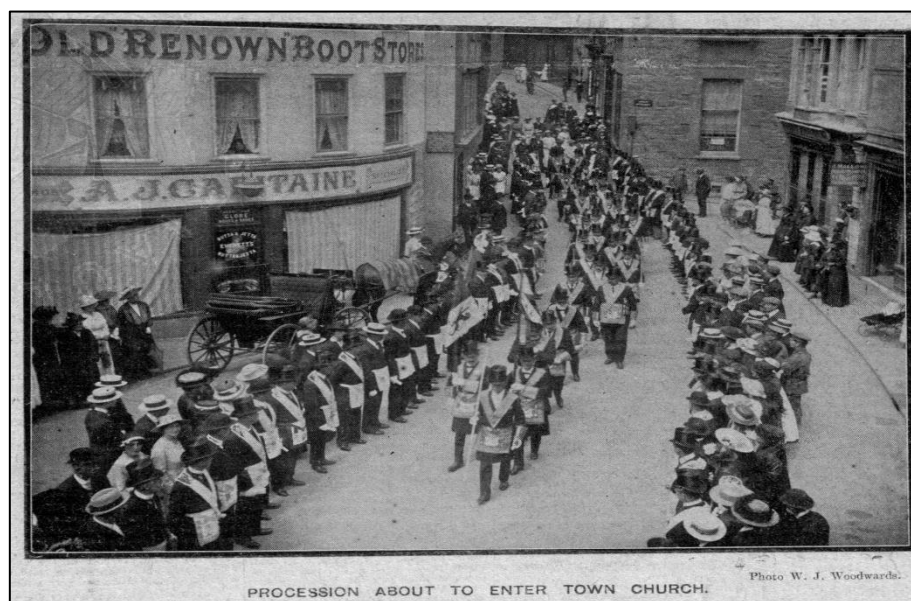
For local Freemasons this saw a special service being held at the Town Church on the 24th June 1917. 150 Brethren assembled in their regalia at the Masonic Temple in Le Marchant Street, St Peter Port and marched in procession two abreast from there down Smith Street and the High Street to the Town Church.

Each Lodge formed up separately with the juniors in the front in the following reverse order of seniority, Hansard Lodge No.3515, Balfour-Cockburn Lodge No.2805, St Sampsons Lodge No.2598, Lodge Fidelis No.1809, Loyalty Lodge No.243, Doyles Lodge of Fellowship No.84 and Mariners Lodge No.168. They were followed by members of the Provincial Grand Lodge along with the Standards of the Provincial Grand Lodge that was presented by the Provincial Grand Master, and the sword of Provincial Grand Lodge.

On arrival at the Town Church the procession halted and opened out to the left and right. The brethren then turned inward and through the lines passed the Standards and Sword and the Deputy Provincial Grand Master followed in order of seniority by the Brethren of Provincial Grand Lodge and the Lodges of the Province.

As part of the celebrations the Lodges of the Province raised £500. This sum of money was presented to WBro Ira C. Ozanne steward to the Masonic Charities, who attended the events at the Albert Hall for the United Grand Lodge of England.

The parade was featured on the front page of the Guernsey Weekly Press on Saturday the 30th June 1917 (images of the weekly press can be found in Appendix C).

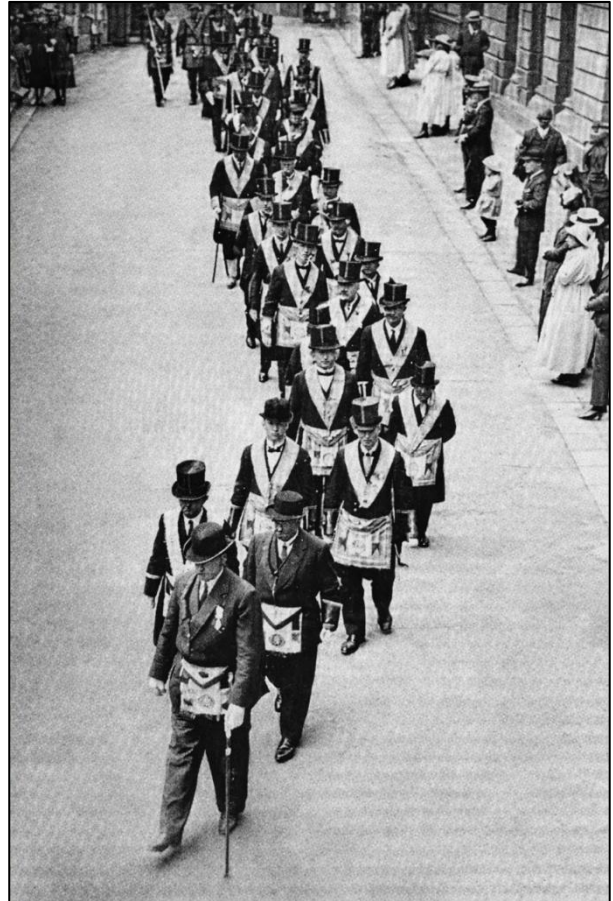

Chapter Eight

St Martins Lodge

During Right Worshipful Brother Hansards tenure as Provincial Grand Master he was the Consecrating Officer of two Lodges. The first we have already covered, being named after him Hansard Lodge No.3515, and the second being St Martins Lodge No.4142.

St Martin's Lodge was Consecrated at 5pm on Friday the 30th September 1920 and was sponsored by Loyalty Lodge No.243. They met at "Dauntless Hall", a granite building that was built in 1902 and used as a rifle club and community hall. It stood on the same site as the current Masonic Centre. It was a central location in the parish and big enough to accommodate 100 members. At the time of the Lodge's consecration the building was very generously offered to the Lodge by the Senior Warden Designate, Brother Harold Barnett who held a bond on the property. The building was purchased by the Lodge from Mr George De Carteret the great grandfather of the V.W. Bro. Simon Hamon Deputy Provincial Grand Master, (who had purchased the site in 1912). With the generous help of its Founders, it was purchased on the 3rd July 1920.

The Minute books for this period were unfortunately lost during the German Occupation, however a transcript of the Consecration Minutes survived and explains the ceremony and who took part.

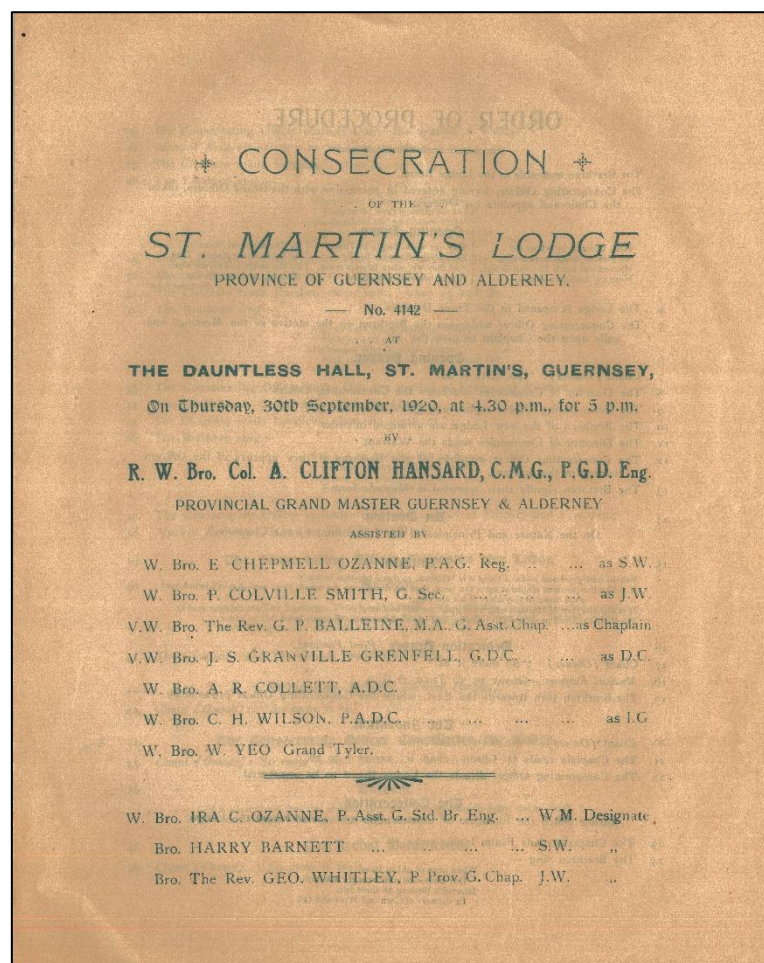

Chapter Nine

Later Life

However, the year 1927 was not a good year for the Hansard family. It started badly on 6th January when Arthur died at his home in Chelsea, London.

The death was reported in the Guernsey Evening Press on the 7th January 1927, *"Death of Col A.C. Hansard, Provincial Grand Master of Guernsey and Alderney. We regret to hear of the death of Colonel A.C. Hansard C.M.G, the Provincial Grand Master of Guernsey and Alderney Freemasons, since 1910.*

The funeral is arranged to take place on Monday, and among those attending will be WBro V.G Carey, Deputy Provincial Grand Master and WBro W.B. Randell Provincial Grand Secretary, Guernsey and Alderney District.

The news of the death of Colonel Hansard has been received with very widespread regret, for he was persona-grata with the Islanders. Col Hansard was born on June 11, 1855 the son of Col L.H. Hansard J.P, he married Miss Marion S. Simons the daughter of Mr H Minichin Simons, whom he leaves, with one son and daughter, to mourn his loss.

Educated at Winchester College, he entered Woolwich in the R.M.A., and was commissioned in the Royal Artillery in 1874, holding several appointments, including D.A.Q.M.G. at Headquarters. He was promoted Lieut.-Col. in 1900 and Colonel in 1906. In 1912 Col. Hansard retired, but the Great War saw him anxious to help his country and he was re-employed from October 1914 to November 1916, when he retired on account of health. His distinguished services in the War were mentioned, and he was awarded the C.M.G.

Guernsey Freemasons knew him and respected him as a very fine example of the fraternity. He succeeded Surgeon -General James Balfour Cockburn as Provincial Grand Master on April 6, 1910. He also held the position of Past Grand Deacon England and Grand Superintendent of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Guernsey and Alderney.

Col. Hansard was here in 1925, when he presided, in the Spring of that year, at the Annual Communication of the Provincial Grand Lodge, and also attended several private Lodges during his visit.

The deceased was an author, among his publications being a Hand-Book and articles on professional subjects. He was an ardent golfer and appreciated play on the L'Ancrese Golf Course. His residence was 17a, Cadogan Gardens, London, S.W.3, and he was a member of the Junior United Service and Hurlingham Clubs".

The funeral was reported in the Guernsey Evening Press on the 14th January 1927 *"The funeral of Col. Arthur Clifton Hansard, C.M.G., late Royal Artillery, who died on January 6, at his residence in Cadogan Gardens, took place on Monday morning. The service at Holy Trinity Church, Sloane Street, was taken by the rector, the Rev. C Cheshire.*

The principal mourners included Mrs. Hansard (widow), Colonel Picot, Commander and Mrs. Eric Carter, Lieut-Col. Frank Burnell-Nugent, Commander Melville Ward, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hansard and Mrs, Luke Hansard. Mr. Luke Hansard (son) and Sir Edward Ward (brother-in-law) were kept away by illness. Mrs. Michael de Lembecke, the late Colonel's only daughter, is on her way home from Peru. A large number of Freemasons, including members of the Supreme Council, of which Colonel Hansard was a member, attended the service He was also Provincial Grand Master of Alderney and Guernsey, and the members of this province were represented by Mr. Victor Carey. Cremation subsequently took place at Golders Green."

Research at Golders Green Crematorium have found the cremation took place on the 10th January 1927 and his ashes were dispersed on the Crocus Lawn, but due to historical recordings at the time the exact location on the lawn is not recorded.

The sad passing of Right Worshipful Brother Hansard saw the end of the fifth Provincial Grand Lodge of Guernsey and Alderney.

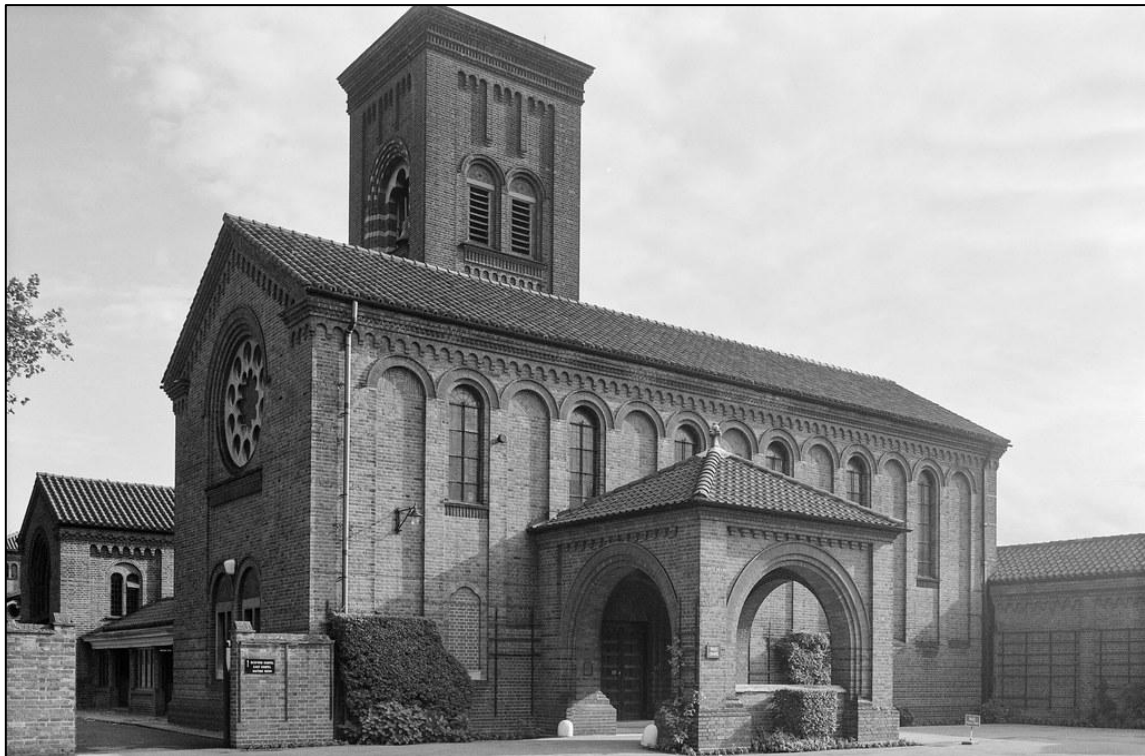
Death has robbed the Province of Guernsey and Alderney of a wise and beloved ruler in the passing, on Saturday, 8th inst., of Bro. Colonel Arthur Clifton Hansard, who has ruled over that Province as Provincial Grand Master since 1910. He was born in 1855 in London, where he passed away, and was initiated in the Ubique Lodge, No. 1789, in May, 1887, being installed W.M. in 1893. He joined the Royal Alpha Lodge, No. 16, of which he was W.M. in 1922, and Doyle's Lodge of Fellowship, No. 84. He was also a Founder of the Old Wykehamist Lodge, No. 3548, and in 1902 was appointed Grand Junior Deacon of England. He was exalted into Royal Arch Masonry in the Ubique Chapter, No. 1789, in September, 1890, and was installed First Principal in 1896. He joined the Studholme Chapter, No. 1591, of which he was also Past First Principal, and Doyle's Chapter of Fellowship, No. 84. He was appointed to the rank of Past Grand Standard Bearer in 1902, and in 1910 received the appointment of Grand Superintendent of Guernsey and Alderney. He held the rank of P.G.W. in the Grand Mark Lodge, and of Second Great Constable in the Great Priory of Knights Templar; he was also a member of the Supreme Council of the 33rd Degree, and held the office of Grand Chamberlain; he also held Grand Rank in the Council of Royal and Select Masters, and was a member of the Royal Order of Scotland. He was Vice-President of the three central Masonic Institutions. The news has been received with great regret in the island of Guernsey, for he was beloved by the islanders.

The death of Right Worshipful Bro Hansard as reported in the Freemason Magazine (Museum of Freemasonry)

The minutes of Hansard Lodge No.3515 also expressed the loss felt by Right Worshipful Brother Hansards passing as was recorded in them on the 24th January 1927 "*His death has come as a great blow to every Lodge in the Province, but to none more deeply than our own. This was due to the great honour that he conferred upon the Lodge at its foundation, when he showed it the greatest honour he could by bestowing upon it the honoured name of his family. Few of us have perhaps ever realised before the deep trust he placed in the members of the Lodge by so doing, and further, granting us the use of a crest of a distinguished English family with great pride in their history. Such kindness and faith throws a big responsibility upon the present and future members of this Lodge, that nothing is ever done to cast the slightest reflection upon the honoured name of Hansard.*"

The year did not get any better for the Hansard family with the death of Arthur's son Luke on the 17th January 1927. At this time Luke was living in Cannes, Alpes-Maritimes, Provence-Alpes-Cote d'Azur, France. This may have been whilst still convalescing from injuries sustained in the Great War, where he was in the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve. Finally, Colonel Hansard's wife Marion died at her residence in Chelsea, London on the 12th June the same year.

The last member of the family was their daughter Arddyn, who married in 1914 and died in Morocco on the 29th May 1969.

1804: Sir John Doyle a Moderns Mason came to Guernsey as Lieutenant Governor.

1805: Lodge of Harmony (No.2) “Antient” warranted No.334, erased 1829.

1806: Sir John Doyle appointed Provincial Grand Master, Second Provincial Grand Lodge begins.

1806: John La Serre appointed Deputy Provincial Grand Master.

1806: Lodge of Fellowship “Antient” warranted No.36, “Doyles” later added to the name. Renumbered No.98 in 1807, No.123 in 1814, No.99 in 1832, No.84 in 1863.

1806: Lodge of Unity “Antient” warranted No.337.

1807: Sir John Doyle “whitewashed” as an Antient on joining Lodge of Fellowship.

1809: Moderns Warrants issued to several Antient Lodges. Mariners' warranted No.611, renumbered No.618 in 1814, amalgamated with parent Lodge 1814. erased in 1829). Orange Lodge warranted No.610. erased 1829. Lodge of Harmony (No. 2) warranted No. 612. (Granted Royal Arch Warrant in 1814 with No. 172. No evidence of working. Erased, together with the Ancient Lodge in 1829). Lodge of Unity warranted No. 613. Renumbered No.620 in 1814, erased 1829.

1809: Lodge of Friendship constituted No.343 "Antient" originally met in Jersey as a Military Lodge and later met on the Sloop "Albion". Met in Guernsey from 1811 and endorsed as a Stationary Lodge by Doyle in 1816. Erased 1832.

The ceremony was followed by a service at the Town Church.

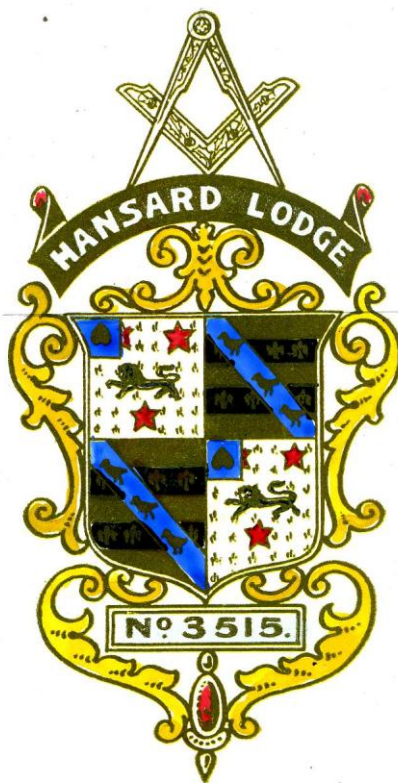

CONSECRATION OF THE HANSARD LODGE, No. 3515.

THE CEREMONY AND THE BANQUET.

Tuesday, the 30th May, 1911, is another red-letter day in the annals of local Freemasonry, as that day marks for ever the consecration of the Hansard Lodge, No. 3515, on the registry of the Grand Lodge of England. The name of the new Lodge, it will be apparent to our readers, is that of Colonel Hansard, the Right Worshipful Grand-Master of the Province of Guernsey and Alderney, who was installed into that office on the 20th July last year.

The ceremony of consecrating the new Lodge took place at 5.15 p.m. in the South New Market Hall, which had been specially prepared for the occasion. This hall has been used for several Masonic functions on a large scale, such as the meetings of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Guernsey and Alderney, and it adapts itself admirably to the purpose.

The members of the various Lodges who had been invited to attend the ceremony having taken their seats, with the founders of the new Lodge seated in the centre of the room, the Rt. Wor. Prov Grand Master Rt. Wor. Bro. A. C. Hansard, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master Rt. Wor. Bro. E. C. Ozanne, and other members of the Provincial Grand Lodge, having entered the Lodge room and been saluted according to custom, the Lodge was opened by the Prov. Grand Master in the three degrees, after which the opening hymn was sung. The singing was led by a special choir, Bro. W. H. Auger being at the harmonium. After the consecrating officer, Rt. Wor. Bro. Hansard had addressed the brethren on the motive of the meeting, the Director of Ceremonies, W. Bro. C H. Wilson, Prov. Grand Secretary of Jersey, read the petition praying for the foundation of the new Lodge as well as the Warrant granting the necessary permission. After a few more formalities, W. Bro. J. Penfold, Provincial Grand Chaplain, delivered an oration which was listened to with deep attention. The consecrating ceremony then proceeded, being interspersed with an anthem and Masonic responses and Odes. The Lodge having been solemnly dedicated, and the Consecrating Officer having constituted the Lodge, the Vesper Hymn was sung, as well as the hymn "Glory to God on High," the ceremony concluding with the Patriarchal Benediction pronounced by W. Bro. J. Penfold.

LODGE BUSINESS.

The Lodge having been duly consecrated the Provincial Grand Master proceeded to install the selected Master, W. Bro. I. C. Ozanne. This having been done, the election of a Treasurer and Tyler followed, after which the W.M. appointed his officers for the ensuing twelve months as follows:

The addresses when the officers had been installed were given by the following brethren: "The Master," W. Bro. W. Stranger; "The Wardens," W. Bro. J. J. C. Gibbons; "The Officers," W. Bro. E. C. Ozanne. Addresses in the various degrees were given by W. Bro. Holmes, W. Bro. R. Le Page, and W. Bro. E. Parry.

The W.M. then presented the Rt. W. Bro. Hansard with a handsome jewel of the Lodge. All the Lodge jewels as well as the beautiful Lodge banner bear the arms of the Hansard's.

After a committee had been elected to frame the by-laws, and several gentlemen proposed as initiates and joining members, the Lodge was closed in due form. Previous, however, to departing the hymn "Abide with me" was sung, during which a collection was made on behalf of the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys. The proceedings terminated at 7.45.

We would like to add that besides the Rt. W. Bro. A. C. Hansard, P.G.D. of England, W. Bro. E. C. Ozanne, P.G.D. of England, W. Bro. G. B. Preston, P.G.D. of England, W. Bro. Charles H. Wilson, Prov. G. Sec. of Jersey, W. Bro. Rev. J. Penfold, Prov. G. Chaplain, and W. Bro. F. G. Frayling, took part in the ceremony.

THE BANQUET.

The banquet which followed the above reported consecration of the Hansard Lodge took place at Gardner's Royal Hotel, the guests who numbered between 70 and 80 taking their places at the prettily decorated tables at 8.15 pm. The chair was taken by W. Bro. I. C. Ozanne who was supported on his right and left by the Provincial Grand Master, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, W. Bro. Wilson, W. Bro. Penfold, W. Bro. Preston, and W. Bro. Malet de Carteret, of the Jersey Provincial Grand Lodge. At the lower end of one of the tables was the Senior Warden of the new Lodge and at the end of the other the Junior Warden of the same.

Grace having been said by the Provincial Grand Chaplain the brethren proceeded to enjoy the following:

At about 9.45 pm the first toast of the evening, "The King and the Craft" was proposed and drunk, followed by that of "H.R.H. the-Duke of Connaught and Strathearn, our most Worshipful Grand Master, and the Officers of Grand Lodge present and past."

After a short interval Rt. W. Bro. E. C. Ozanne proposed the health of the Rt. W. Prov. G. Master. This W. Bro Ozanne qualified as the most important toast of the evening.

Rt. W. Bro. Hansard in reply expressed his great satisfaction at having been able to take part in the ceremony that afternoon, and he could assure all of the very great interest he would always take in the new Lodge. He was grateful for the toast, but he thought that particular credit for the success of the consecration ceremony was due to the Director of Ceremonies, W. Bro. C. H. Wilson, Bro. Auger, the organist, and others.

Bro. H. A. Gliddon then proposed the health of the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, Bro. E. C. Ozanne. The brethren could not help bearing in mind what W. Bro. Ozanne had done for Masonry in Guernsey, particularly during the time when he acted as foster-father to the Provincial Grand Lodge. He was sure all were proud to see W. Bro. Ozanne among them and asked all to drink his health most cordially.

W. Bro. Ozanne first of all spoke in a humorous vein. Then he thanked the brethren for having so warmly drunk his health. He considered it a great privilege to be among them that evening. The afternoon's proceeding had been a rare occasion, one that usually happened only once in a lifetime. He was also very pleased to have been able to take part in that most impressive ceremony, and once more heartily thanked the brethren.

W. Bro. Preston proposed "Success to the Hansard Lodge." He also was very pleased that he had assisted in the ceremony. In conclusion he cordially wished the new Lodge all prosperity and believed that it would become one of the best of English Lodges. Rt. Wor. Bro. Hansard proposed the health of the Worshipful Master, W. Bro. I. C. Ozanne, in very warm terms. The success of a Lodge depended much on its Worshipful Master. The Hansard Lodge had selected W. Bro. Ozanne as their master and had entrusted its destiny to him. The speaker believed W. Bro. Ozanne to be a good man and Mason and would do the Lodge credit from its foundation. He had worked hard for the charities and had not been unsuccessful. The speaker assured Bro. Ozanne that he would not lose sight of the Hansard Lodge and expressed his satisfaction that Bro. Ozanne was the first W.M. of the new Lodge. He asked all to drink the toast so warmly that Bro. Ozanne would understand they wished him well.

W. Bro. Ozanne in replying and expressing his thanks said he felt extremely proud to have been selected as the first Master of the Hansard Lodge and would always do his utmost to further its success. He thanked the brethren for the hearty support they had given him.

W. Bro. V. Carey then proposed the health of the Consecrating Officer. In his remarks he spoke very warmly of the splendid manner in which the Prov Grand Master had carried out his work that afternoon. He also congratulated the Wardens on the excellent manner in which they had discharged their share of the work, and eulogized W. Bro. Wilson upon the admirable manner in which he had acted as Director of Ceremonies. In fact, the work he had done could not have been surpassed by anyone. Bro. Carey also complimented Bro. Auger upon the efficient manner he had discharged his duties at the Organ, the musical service under his direction having added no little share to the success of the affair.

W. Bro. Penfold replied for the Officers. This was the first consecrating ceremony which he had attended, and he would be willing again to act in the same capacity as that day's should occasion arise.

W. Bro. Maclean proposed the "Visitors,". He assured them that the Hansard Lodge was most gratified by the manner in which the invitations to attend had been responded to. The Lodge was specially grateful for the presence of so many distinguished Masons.

W. Bro. C. E. Malet de Carteret, of Jersey, replied most cordially to the toast. He regretted that more of the Jersey brethren were not present. Several had made up their minds to cross specially for the occasion, but circumstances had prevented them from doing so. He was grateful for the hospitality which had been accorded to the Visitors, and he wished the new Lodge all prosperity, and concluded by hoping that the Worshipful Master would have a most successful and pleasant term of office.

Bro. Rees of Australia also expressed his great satisfaction with all the proceedings both that afternoon and evening. He would be pleased to welcome any visitor from this Province in his own Lodge abroad.

The toast of the "Sister Lodges" was entrusted to the Prov. Grand Master Bro. E. C. Ozanne.

In referring to the excellent manner in which the consecrating ceremony had been conducted, he remarked that it had been arranged that every Lodge in the Province should take part in the ceremony, and all present had been able to see that this decision had been carried out. The toast he would like to mention, did not only include the Sister Lodges of this Province, but those of other Provinces, including the Colonies. In conclusion he wished the newly consecrated Lodge prosperity, harmony and love.

W. Bro. T. P. Holmes responded to the toast and said he replied principally on behalf of the grandfather Lodge. He trusted the Hansard would have plenty of candidates, but those of the right sort. He gave the newly consecrated Lodge a hearty greeting.

W Bro. Frayling also responded and wished the new Lodge all success and prosperity.

The Worshipful Master, Bro. I. C. Ozanne, then proposed "The Charities." There were three Institutions which had a great claim on Freemasons, the Boys', the Girls', and the Aged People. It was the duty of all Freemasons to support these Institutions to the utmost of their ability. Personally he took the deepest interest in all Masonic charities, and trusted that the Channel Islands Masons would do even more for the Charities in the future than they had in the past, for he would like to point out that we drew more benefit from the three Institutions than we paid into them. In conclusion he asked the brethren to drink success to the Charities.

W. Bro. J. R. Peake replied to the toast and thanked the various Lodges for the liberal support they had accorded him when he went up as the Steward from the Province. He was glad to think that charity was the leading characteristic in a Freemason's heart.

W. Bro. C. C. Bush briefly proposed the health of the Immediate Past Master and Officers of the Hansard Lodge.

W. Bro. V. G. Carey replied, and after alluding to the remark that one of the visitors had made with regard to the proportion of Masons to voters in the United Kingdom, he said that in Guernsey the proportion of Masons to voters was 8 to 1. If the Hansard Lodge prospered, as he trusted it would, in the future this proportion would doubtless be altered to 4 to 1.

This concluded the official toasts, and after the Tyler had proposed the last toast, at 11 o'clock the brethren settled down to a little harmony, several excellent songs being contributed. The proceedings terminated at midnight, the greatest harmony and good-fellowship having prevailed throughout the proceedings, both at the Market Halls and at the Hotel.

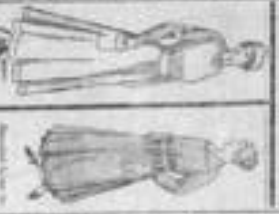
